# NZIF welcomes 'Why Pines?' paper, advocates for diverse forestry integration

THE New Zealand Institute of Forestry (NZIF) welcomes the recent publication of the paper titled 'Why Pines?', A Context for Recent Research Results from the Our Land and Water Science Challenge. This important research provides a valuable context for understanding the role of pine forestry in New Zealand's landscape, particularly in terms of land conversion and economic viability.

However, in a statement, NZIF said, that while NZIF acknowledges the insights presented, we believe the discussion should not be limited to a binary choice between pine and other types of trees. Instead, the focus should be on the strategic incorporation of a wide range of tree species into New Zealand's landscapes.

"Forestry is not a matter of choosing one type of tree over another. The goal should be to create a mosaic of farm paddocks and trees which enhances both economic returns and environmental sustainability," says James Treadwell, President of NZIF. "We need to think about

forestry in a holistic manner, placing trees where they will deliver the greatest benefits."

NZIF advocates for a strategic approach where plantation species, such as pines, are integrated into farms on less productive land. These trees can contribute to New Zealand's emissions trading scheme (ETS) and serve as a valuable future timber resource.

In parallel, native trees and long-lived species should be prioritised in riparian zones, on steep and highly erodible land, and in areas of farms where harvesting would be uneconomic. These native plantings play a critical role in enhancing biodiversity, protecting waterways, and stabilising soils, contributing to the overall health of the ecosystem. They can also be entered into the ETS providing the landowner income.

A practical rule of thumb to guide landowners might be trees should be planted in areas where sheep and beef are creating contour tracks around hillsides. This approach not only supports sustainable land use but also promotes biodiversity and enhances the resilience of the landscape.

NZIF remains committed to promoting the sustainable management of New Zealand's forests, recognising the need for a diversified

approach which balances economic, environmental, and social goals.

## Plantation grant recipients and workforce training providers announced

THE Albanese Government has used National Forestry Day (August 20) to announce Round 2 recipients under the Support Plantation Establishment Program (SPEP) and that ForestWorks Ltd will deliver the Forestry Workforce Training Program (FWTP) promised at the 2022 Federal Election, Chief Executive Officer of the Australian Forest Products Association (AFPA), Diana Hallam said today.

"On behalf of Australia's forest industries, we welcome and thank the Hon. Julie Collins MP, Minister for Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry and the Albanese Government for these announcements, both fulfilling Labor election commitments made in 2022, on National Forestry Day," Diana Hallam said.

Eight new plantation projects in NSW, Victoria, WA and Tasmania have been

announced under Round 2 of the SPEP worth \$5.65 million. They are, in addition to the 19 projects from Round 1 worth over \$10 million.

ForestWorks Ltd has

also been confirmed as the provider for the \$10 million FWTP and will deliver a suite of activities to improve qualification and credentials access for the sector. It will

include pilot projects and trials including a school-to-work traineeship transition program, mentorship for Indigenous Australians and women, and improving training in remote and regional Australia.

"Ongoing investment in Australia's forest industries is critical for the sector to realise its potential for the decades ahead. We are responsible for essential and high quality, sustainable products, provide highly skilled jobs across Australia, and are a big part of Australia's climate change solution and path to net zero emissions," Diana Hallam said.

"We welcome the Government and Minister Collins using National Forestry Day to recognise the broader sector through the plantation establishment and workforce training announcements. It certainly was a very happy National Forestry Day!" Diana Hallam concluded.

## **Forestry Corporation make rare discovery**

A RARE Coastal Emu nest, containing nine eggs, has been discovered by Forestry Corporation staff in a State forest on the North Coast, giving hope for the future of the endangered population.

IT'S AN AMAZING PROSPECT The NSW Government, under Saving Our Species, has invested years of conservation and habitat protection work on the North Coast to save the Coastal Emu, after the population was classified as endangered.

Forestry Corporation's Senior Ecologist Chris Slade said the discovery of the nest was a significant ecological find and every effort will now be taken to ensure the nest contributes to recovery actions for the population.

"It is estimated that there may be fewer than 50 Coastal Emus left on the North Coast, so to discover a nest bearing eggs, is a significant moment for that endangered population," Mr Slade said.

"It's an amazing prospect as the timing of the discovery is perfect in the sense that every effort can now be taken to try and ensure those eggs hatch into emu chicks."

Genetically isolated from their western emu relatives, Coastal Emus have faced high mortality rates due to predation and car strikes.

Loss of emus from the North Coast would have a serious impact on the environment, as the birds eat and spread fruits and seeds across a range of coastal habitats.

The emu also has significant cultural value to Yaegl, Gumbaynggirr and Bundjalung peoples.

"The nest found by Kurt is within the distribution of the threatened emu population," Mr Slade explained.

"Forestry Corporation is now working with Saving Our Species on the best way to ensure this nest contributes to broader recovery actions," he said.

The Coastal Emu, (Dromaius novaehollandiae) was once widespread across north-eastern NSW, but is now only found within the Evans Head, Red Rock and Bungawalbin areas.

# Peter Duncan AM to chair expert panel consulting on Industry Action Plan

THE NSW Government has announced the appointment of an expert panel to lead consultation on a Forestry Industry Action Plan, which will outline the path NSW will take to ensure a sustainable timber industry which the Minn's Government says will 'align with the government's key environmental priorities'.

Peter Duncan AM will chair the Independent Forestry Panel, bringing more than 40 years of experience in primary industries, infrastructure and regional NSW. Professor Mary O'Kane AC and the Hon. Mick Veitch will also sit on the Panel.

According to the Minns Government, the panel will be tasked with consulting with a broad range of stakeholders and reporting to the Government on the best options to achieve the balance between sustainable supplies of timber and our environmental commitments.

Stakeholders include representatives from the timber industry, forest growers, environment groups, unions, Aboriginal communities, local government, businesses, related industries, tourism, scientific experts and the Commonwealth Government.

The Plan will address the following key areas:

- Sustainability of current and future forestry operations in NSW;
- Environmental and cultural values of forests, including threatened species;
- Community demand for timber products, particularly as relates to NSW housing, construction, mining, transport and retail;
- The future of softwood and hardwood plantations and the continuation of Private Native Forestry in helping meet timber supply needs;
- The role of State Forests in maximising the delivery of a range of environmental, economic and social outcomes;
- Opportunities to realise

carbon and biodiversity benefits and support carbon and biodiversity markets, and mitigate and adapt to climate change risks; and

- Greenhouse gas emission impacts of different uses of forests and assessment of climate change risks to forests.

The former Coalition
Government neglected to plan

for the future of this industry, so the NSW Government is taking action to give certainty to communities, workers and industry.

"The NSW Government is consulting on the future of forestry in NSW," Minister for the Environment Penny Sharpe said

"Whether it's hardwood, softwood or private native forest, our forests and the native species which call them home have faced challenges

including bushfires, floods and the ongoing risks due to climate change.

"We want your input on what forests and a sustainable forestry industry will look like in the next 30 years.

Grants are provided by State and Federal Governments and in some cases work together or in conjunction with some large LGA. As we understand it, not all grants are made public as high-demand or a quick closing date might result in communication being limited to registered grant writers. Keep an eye on *Enews* as we list what is open and potentially available to you.

A NEW grant that aims to foster new industries and innovation business expansion in Western Australia's native forestry timber region is now open.

The \$3 million grant program offers businesses up to \$250,000 in matched funding to support economic diversification and sustainable job creation within the native forestry timber region.

The grant is designed to foster new industries and innovative business expansion to enable a vibrant and sustainable future for the native forestry timber region.

15 local government areas make up the native forestry region and to be eligible for funding, the proposal must occur within one of the local government areas within the native forestry region.

Applicants must meet the following criteria:

- Submit only one application
- Hold an Australian Company Number (ACN) or Australian Business Number (ABN)
- Be registered for Goods and Services Tax (GST)

- Be a solvent business based in Western Australia, including recent financial statements or projections to demonstrate financial capacity
- Be a legal entity capable of entering into a legally binding funding agreement with the Western Australian Government
- For applicants (directors/ owners, even if applying under a different business) that have received previous NFTP funding, apply only for the difference up to \$250,000 and for new

projects only

- Submit a comprehensive application via Smarty Grants, answering all questions
- Be able to sign the Financial Assistance Agreement (FAA) within 60 days of the grant award.

Proposals must also demonstrate the ability to:

- Be delivered within, or propose outcomes within, the native forestry region
- Be completed within 12 months of signing the FAA.
   Projects may be staged

but must provide a clear pathway to completion with staged outcomes

- Obtain or submit all necessary approvals, with timeframes accounting for any outstanding approvals
- Provide proof of matched funding, such as bank statements, loan approval, or partnership agreements (except for businesses with at least 50% reliance on the native timber industry)
- Include a comprehensive business plan detailing the project's goals, strategies, financial projections, and expected outcomes
- Attach any additional supporting documentation, such as letters of support, approvals, environmental assessments, or technical feasibility studies.

Applications for the grant are now open with round one closing on 6 October.

## NZ Mayors and PM gather to discuss mill closures

MAYORS from the Central North Island districts in New Zealand, Ruapehu, Kawerau and Taupo, whose forestry mill operations are threatened by soaring electricity prices, have met with the New Zealand Prime Minister Hon. Chris Luxon and Regional Development Minister Hon. Shane Jones to discuss urgent actions to prevent the closure of mills and other export manufacturers.

Ruapehu Mayor Weston Kirton, Kawerau Mayor Faylene Tunui, and Taupo Mayor David Trewavas, together with local iwi, expressed united concern for the central North Island economy and its communities following Winstone Pulp International's (WPI) announcement of plans to shut down its Tangiwai Sawmill and Karioi Pulpmill due to unsustainable energy costs.

They warned that this impending closure is only the 'tip of the iceberg' unless an urgent solution is found for other New Zealand export manufacturers

facing similar pressures from unsustainable energy costs.

The mayors were 'cautiously optimistic' about the prospects of keeping WPI operational after they met with the Prime Minister and the Regional Development Minister.

"There is no doubt that the Prime Minister and Minister

Jones are acutely aware of what is at stake. They share our concerns for the economy and our communities, and want to find a workable solution," said Mayor Kirton.

"The government has demonstrated its commitment by inviting us to collaborate with WPI and present a proposal outlining what it would take to keep the mills operating. We are now urgently working to develop a solution to put to them.

We are grateful for the government's attention and support in addressing the

immediate crisis facing WPI. The government has committed to considering whatever short-term solution we can put forward while they work to establish a long-term fix to prevent such a situation from arising again in the future," he said.

## 'Strong as steel' - hardwood hub eyed off for Green Triangle

FORESTRY companies
Bluegum plantations,
Midway, and New Forests
are collaborating with Green
Triangle Forest Industries
Hub (GTFIH) and the Victorian
Forest Products Association
(VFPA) to develop a hardwood
timber manufacturing hub in
Victoria's Glenelg Shire that
could utilise engineered soft
and hardwood products.

The group has unveiled plans for feasibility studies that would support a business case to construct an integrated manufacturing hub, examining the best location close to existing facilities which could help grow a new regional hardwood-engineered timber product industry.

Bluegum Plantations CEO Russ Hughes said early research has shown a potential new hardwood manufacturing hub could create 40 full-time jobs as well as more than 100 jobs during its construction phase. He added that it would support new highly skilled jobs and boost the local economy

while strengthening the forestry sector.

Midway managing director Tony McKenna said this manufacturing hub could support the development of a sustainable building product that could replace steel or concrete, providing the same durability with less embodied carbon.

During National Forestry Day, the group showcased their latest development. This new engineered wood product, two years in the making, is a Glue Laminated Timber made entirely from the bluegum eucalyptus grown in the region's green triangle, which runs across Victoria and South Australia.

The group's prototype
Glue Laminated Timber
product aligns with the Green
Triangle Forest Industries
Hub's Splinters to Structures
program, which aimed to
create hybrid wood products
that could meet the rising
demand from the housing and
construction industries for
more sustainable wood.

Blue laminated timber,

known as Glulam or GLT, has high strength and load-bearing capabilities and can potentially replace steel and concrete beams in load-bearing structures. While it is made from different, smaller pieces of wood glued together, because all the wood is oriented in one direction within the product it acts as a single solid piece of wood.

Henkel recently announced it would begin producing its Loctite brand of polyurethane adhesives in Australia to support the increased interest in engineered timber for construction, as the world's tallest timber hotel is built in Adelaide and the world's tallest hybrid timber building is approved for construction in Perth.

Henkel said that engineered wood had become "an increasingly popular design choice for load-bearing mass timber and high-tech structural engineering application" due to growing environmental awareness around construction and material use.

A prototype of the new GLT Hardwood was shared with the Victorian Government on National Forestry Day.

## China's wood furniture exports surge

China's wood furniture export volume surged by 24% year-on-year in the first seven months of 2024, reaching 256 million pieces. This sharp increase in volume drove a 9% rise in export value to \$13.4 billion, despite a decline in average prices, according to Lesprom Analytics.

Chinese furniture exports in the first seven months of

2024 were on pace to reach an annual rate of 439 million pieces, approaching the historical peak of 452 million pieces set in 2021. Meanwhile, the average price per piece fell by 12% to \$52, suggesting that Chinese exporters are attempting to stimulate demand by lowering prices.

The United States remained the largest destination for


Chinese wood furniture, accounting for 30% of exports. Shipments to the U.S. rose by 20% to 77 million pieces, despite a 13% drop in the average price per piece. The total export value to the U.S. increased by 5% to \$3.9 billion.

Germany saw significant growth, with a 35% increase in export volume to 13 million pieces and a 30% rise in value to \$420 million. The Netherlands posted the highest volume growth, with exports increasing by 74% to 12 million pieces, leading to a 39% rise in value to \$296 million. The United Kingdom saw exports grow by 23% to 17 million pieces, with the total value rising by 10% to \$842 million, despite a 10% drop in the average price to \$50 per piece.

### Ireland calls for increase in timber use

IRELAND'S Climate Change Advisory Council (CCAC) has urged the government to adopt more sustainable construction methods to reduce sector emissions immediately. Publishing its annual review of Ireland's industry and waste sectors, the CCAC emphasised the need for increased timber use and modern construction methods (MMC). It also called for whole-life carbon assessments and targets in planning public buildings to meet sectoral targets. The review noted a 6%

drop in industrial emissions from the EU Emissions Trading Scheme (ETS) in 2023, with reductions in the food sector, pharmaceuticals manufacturing and cement production.

Commenting on the review, Marie Donnelly, Chair, CCAC, said: "One of the primary sources of industrial emissions is cement production. We must address this now by promoting more sustainable building methods, including increasing the use of timber in construction and reducing emissions in the cement production process.

David Murray, Head of Technical Affairs & Ireland Sales, Medite Smartply, believes the CCAC's pressing call to increase the use of timber in the construction of new builds in Ireland recognises timber's vast potential as a construction method.

He explained: "At the individual building level, carbon storage is approximately 50% higher in timber-framed homes

than in masonry homes. Timber has already proven itself as a good alternative to less sustainable construction methods. According to the CIF, 48% to 50% of new-build homes in Ireland are timberframed, compared to less than 25% in 2021. This illustrates the sharp rise in timber frame construction over the past two years, which is widely expected to continue growing and shows the promising potential of timber in meeting the growing housing demand."

# Governments cannot tax their way to increased housing supply - HIA

"LEGISLATION introduced in Victoria will not improve housing supply or reduce pressure on public housing stock," stated HIA's Chief Economist, Tim Reardon.

Mr Reardon was speaking in response to the introduction of the 'Short Stay Levy Bill 2024'.

"The contention is that taxing short-stay accommodation will see more homes be made available for long term rentals and raise revenue to

fund public housing," added Mr Reardon.

"No one supports landlords withholding

homes from the market.
But the proposition that

accommodation will increase

another tax on short-stay

housing supply or make more homes available for rent, in the long term, lacks logic.

"The 'first order effect' of a tax on short-term rentals may see some rental properties become available for long-term accommodation. The second-order effects will negate this benefit. Fewer short-term rentals, and growing demand, will see the rent on these properties continue to rise attracting landlords back out of the long-term rental market.

"Taxing short stay accommodation does not increase housing supply. In the long run, it will increase

rental prices in short and long stay rental properties.

"This is just another tax on housing, that will reduce the supply of homes further and exacerbate the problem.

"This tax comes on top of other new taxes and costs on housing in recent years including:

A windfall gains tax, whereby when land is rezoned, any subsequent uplift in the value of that land more than \$100,000 is taxed at a rate of up to 62.5 per cent.

A land tax surcharge for Victorians with more than one home, up to a \$975 flat surcharge plus a 0.1 per cent increased rate of land tax.

An absentee owner surcharge of 4 per cent, up from 0.5 per cent in 2016.

A vacant residential land tax of up to 3 per cent on the capital improved value of taxable land

The latest changes to the National Construction Code, which add tens of thousands of dollars to the cost of construction of a new home

"Governments cannot increase the supply of housing by taxing them more, even if the revenue is allocated to new public housing stock. This is an own goal that will further reduce

housing supply and place more pressure on public housing stock.

"A lack of public housing is not the cause of the housing crisis, and it is therefore not the solution. It is a symptom of higher government taxes and costs on housing.

"Victoria requires more public housing stock, and this is the right time in the cycle to build more public housing.

"But public housing is a public good and should be paid for by all Victorians, not

a tax on a narrow cohort of renters or households.

"Burdening new home buyers and renters with the cost of providing public or subsidised housing is part of the cause of this housing shortage, not the solution.

"Up to 50 per cent of the cost of a house and land package is taxes, fees and charges. Housing is the most heavily taxed item in the economy other than fuel, alcohol and tobacco.

"It is these taxes and government regulations that are the cause of the housing shortage and removing them is the solution.

## **\$3 million boost to sustainable wood construction in Canada**

NEW, low-carbon construction materials and technologies allow for the sector to create greener, climate-resilient homes in Canada. Thanks to innovative solutions, the construction and automobile sectors are reducing emissions and supporting sustainable job creation across the Canadian supply chain.

Francis Scarpaleggia, Member of Parliament for Lac-Saint-Louis, Canada, on behalf of the Honourable Jonathan Wilkinson, Minister of Energy and Natural Resources, announced a federal contribution of more than \$2.8 million to FPInnovations for three projects. The funding includes investments to support the use of low-carbon Canadian wood in the Canadian construction market and a project to support the use of zero-emissions vehicles in the forestry and commercial transportation sectors. These investments are provided through Natural Resources Canada's (NRCan) Green Construction through Wood (GCWood) program and the Zero Emission Vehicle Awareness Initiative (ZEVAI).

To support the expansion of low-carbon construction materials, FPInnovations will collect and analyse market data and develop market intelligence with several collaborators in provinces across Canada. This will involve research and testing activities to enable the commercialization of various wood-building systems and to generate the necessary data to enable these woodbased systems to be adopted in Canadian building codes.

NRCan is providing more than \$2.5 million through its GCWood Program to FPInnovations for these two initiatives.

FPInnovations will also develop resources to support the use of vehicles that are zero-emission or use clean fuels through demonstrations, short operational trials and highlights — helping to reduce emissions and enhance the modernization of the Canadian forestry and commercial transportation sectors. NRCan is investing over \$212,000 to FPInnovations through the ZEVAI to support this initiative.

Through a historic series of investments, including the GCWood program, the Government of Canada is helping forest sector workers in Montreal and across the country to adopt the most cutting-edge technologies available to drive down costs and help the construction industry access the low-carbon Canadian wood products it needs to build more homes for Canadians.

"FPInnovations has been a long-standing pillar of applied research in one of Canada's most important resource-based sectors," The Honourable Jonathan Wilkinson Minister of Energy and Natural Resource said.

"The funding announcement highlights the vital partnership between the federal government and FPInnovations in guiding the forestry industry's ongoing transformation. With the help of this federal contribution, FPInnovations will be able to conduct market research to expand the role of wood in residential and commercial construction."

"It will also be able to conduct research to adapt ZEV and LEV technology to vehicles used in forestry operations. In both cases, the government and FP Innovations together are helping Canada's efforts to lower our emissions and meet our GHG targets in the fight against climate change," he said.
